Editorial: . . .

VOTE!

How fortunate we are to live in a democracy with freedom, liberty and equality, a democracy developed by years of hard political work and forged by the courage and bravery of many military veterans.

Our democracy is threatened by the political turmoil, chaos and disintegration of democracy in the United States. The trucker convoy is but one example of this erosion that is creeping northward. We should steel ourselves against such political upheavals such as the January 6 insurrection in Washingtom. Let us hope it remains an isolated incident quarantined to the USA.

Voter apathy

We are faced with other difficulties, the worst may be *voter apathy*, particularly in municipal elections where voters may see themselves as playing for the farm team instead of the big leagues. The election turnout in the last election in this city, one of significant size, was less than 20%. Less than 1/5 of the population voted.

Role of municipal government

Municipal governments affect citizens daily, more than the federal and provincial ones. Essential services regulated municipally: garbage collection, water management/supply, maintenance of parks, roadways, summer, winter...all managed by the city.

Civil servants accountable to you

You have a say in city management with your vote. You elect the city councillors. Selecting good representatives is enough of a challenge on its own but not voting means you give management of your city, its policies and its actions, a pass. Perhaps you bring your voice to municipal council meetings to address councillors with your opinions, comments and suggestions. More likely, you are at work or at home after work, being with your family. That is as it should be but does it mean you don't care how your city is managed? You have a say in every election. It takes minutes to go to a polling station and cast your ballot. This election electronic voting should make voting even easier. Will it persuade you to participate in city management by voting?

Your vote means you control who sits on city council. Your vote reminds them that they are accountable to you. Why would you toss away that power?

Additionally, by voting you are showing that you recognize and appreciate your fellow citizens' committing themselves to working in government on your behalf. You demonstrate that you value and respect these individuals for their devotion, energy, and effort in managing the city for you. Such commitment has costs: candidates give up a lot to become candidates; their income changes; they lose time with their families; they lose fulfilling family responsibilities; in short their family life is eroded. Yet, they still pick up the mantle of civic duty and commit to working for you.

The above is more than 'idealism' or 'generic-speak.' It is fact. A candidate came to our home recently — a parent who is upset with the current municipal government — and explained the costs, time and commitment needed to be a candidate. This dissatisfaction became a campaign effort to change the current city council. A clear

demonstration of their regard for civic responsibility and civic commitment!

The bottom line

VOTE. Vote because you care about the city in which you live. Vote because you support democracy. Vote because you want to continue living in a society you control, you manage. Vote because you care!



There is currently farming on the **Federal Lands** in Ward 3. The original amount of expropriated land was the size of Ajax. Farmland is critical for our food supply. 319 acres of farmland disappear every day in Ontario. Some Pickering politicians are saying the Pickering land is airport lands. This is simply not true. There are many legitimate problems with the 75 towers, from dramatic traffic increase concerns, to the impact on existing homes and businesses.

Affordable Housing needs to be a priority in development planning. This is important for all segments of society... for young families, and to accommodate the particular needs for housing for our seniors. These all have to be planned appropriately for what is best for their lifestyle and health care.

A Lobbying Registry was voted against in Pickering! Why?

In April of 2021 City Council in Pickering voted against the creation of a Lobbying Registry for the City of Pickering. Part of the Motion reads: "... public office holders and the public should be able to know who is attempting to influence the decisions of municipal government ..." .

Accountability and Transparency Some members of council have become too complacent.
