Dear Friends,

Homelessness is a serious problem our community is facing and the City of Pickering is tackling Homelessness through an Agricultural Lens.

With the help of *TACC*, who owns the property at 690 Third Concession (Greenbelt-Agricultural Lands) and *DARs*, along with the financial support of the Pickering Council through a \$50,000 grant paid for from Casino revenues, Mayor Kevin Ashe, Councillor Shaheen Butt and I have joined Margaret Eskins and numerous community volunteers for the Official launch of one of Canada's first transitional housing entrepreneurship projects that will provide affordable transitional housing for up to seven residents. These residents will have an opportunity to be part of a model based on an Agricultural scope. The model includes farming and farm-related production, fresh produce and eggs. Excess produce will be donated to the Pickering Food Bank, as well as sold at the Farmers Market.

Creating a sense of home is part of this model with residents having an opportunity to transform this century farmhouse into their home with the assistance of qualified contractors.

Watch for further updates with a ribbon cutting scheduled for October 10, International Homeless Day Awareness.

Dear Neighbours,

We value the importance of providing our children with safe and enriching natural outdoor spaces to play, learn, and grow together with their peers. With the help of the Fairport Beach Neighbourhood Association, we propose a complete revitalization of the current schoolyard with a pavement paint project. Playing in natural spaces provides children with important opportunities to flex their imaginations, refocus attention, connect with their peers, and stay physically active.

Research demonstrates that children feel more ready to learn when they can centre themselves both mentally and physically. Studies analyzing physical activity of schoolchildren before and after playground paint renovations show that these simple projects lead to long term improvements in children's development. Importantly, as we navigate shrinking residential green spaces and children's increased use of technology, these outcomes are more dramatic for children who have fewer opportunities to engage with nature outside of school hours. A revitalization of our outdoor space at Fairport Beach P.S. is long overdue. Currently, our only asphalt markings include faded keys around two basketball nets and a few empty white squares. There is great potential for this to be a vibrant space for our children to play hopscotch, basketball, snakes and ladders, or run through an activity track.

Ageing affects Hand Function. <u>Hand</u> function decreases with age in both men and women, especially after the age of 65 years. Deterioration in hand function in the elderly population is, to a large degree, secondary to age-related degeneration changes and to the deterioration of the musculature, vascular, and nervous systems.

This deterioration of hand function in elderly adults is inevitable, usually combined with additional pathological conditions, such as <u>osteoporosis</u>, <u>osteoarthritis</u>, <u>rheumatic arthritis</u>, and <u>Parkinson's disease</u>).

2. Poke!Book

I found a writing app described as useful for poetry writers, but I think it can also be used by all writers. Poke!Book is free, and stores everything locally in your browser. Its main feature is that it displays *two notepads* side by side—one for the writing poetry and the other for making notes. The lined notepad expands infinitely, and makes it painless to delete and change line breaks. And best of all, it doesn't auto-capitalize when you start a new line. Be sure to save your work

properly with a title for future recall. [in my tests, Poke!Book was undependable in returning my saved work. I caution users from its use.

I have been a member of the CAA, The Canadian Automobile Association, for many years. As I have the mechanical skills of a displaced African simian, I need the CAA and have used its services numerous times over many years. My car battery has died a few times, mostly for lack of use. Eventually, the CAA service agent suggested a new battery as the old one had outlived its life-span. Surprisingly, the agent promoted the car maker's battery over the CAA replacement explaining that the car maker's product was more durable and more dependable, though he redeemed himself by underlining that the value of the CAA battery was an *acceptable value*.

Triptiks

'Triptiks' are wonderfully practical map booklets in a mini flip notebook form. They are custom assembled for upcoming specific driving holidays containing maps of the journey, each page sectioned into practical driving duration sections. Additionally, they include brief notes about various aspects along the route. Handy, informational and practical compact for easy use in the car.

Maps

My wife is attached to use of hard copy maps no matter how much I tout the benefits and advantages of automobile GPS technology. She holds to her printed maps like a squirrel to the last acorn in late summer. Charlton Heston's "can't pry from my dead hands' comes to mind. In any case, CAA provides members with maps for every province in Canada, the United States and some of the more popular world travel destinations. Very handy if you have a map aficionado in the passenger seat.

Obvious as to its meaning, service is always efficient and timely. Wonderful for those like me who start shaking when the hood is opened.

The CAA has one of the very best phone redirection services you can ever experience. Clear, concise, crisply stated and each section ends with "For all other inquiries, press #." Press that final selection each time ultimately gets you to a live person.

In my case, I was connected to "Charlotte," a very personable and patient staff person. She was a pro at listening patiently until I finished. Then, crisply responding with an appropriate explanation or instruction.

More importantly, when I informed her my purpose in inquiring for information for this article, she was even more helpful. When asked if connecting with the office of President Jay Woo, a deluge of praise was released. 

My first selection for this month is an historical fiction. Historical fiction helps readers relate the past to the present and that's exactly what author Geraldine Brooks does in all her books. Her latest book is "*Horse*." This story is about a record breaking racehorse named Lexington. This horse was a legend in the 1850s. Brooks also fast forwards the story to 2019 to a Smithsonian scientist and a Nigerian art student. The stories blend well together and give us a picture of the American culture during the civil war and how it continues to impact present day. It is a very moving story.

A New Season

"A New Season" by local Canadian author Terry Fallis. I have heard Terry speak about his books on two different occasions. The Last Repair Shop

A little detour from books. OK, OK, a big detour, the Oscar winner for short documentaries, "The Last Repair Shop."

This presentation is a cinematic tribute to the people, staff and musicians connected with a small musical instrument repair shop hidden away in a lowly

neighbourhood of Los Angeles.

The documentary is an unpretentious, low key presentation. It plucks the strings of viewers' souls with its engaging and empathetic cast: students, musicians, and repair staff connected by the instruments they repaired or they play as Los Angeles school district music students or alumni. The staff who repair broken instruments are soul touching 'nobodies' whose stories tug at the heart strings. Poor, gay, marginalized, young and old, these staff members have found a meaningful home in the repair shop. Each recounts their life's journey reaching their final destination - the instrument repair shop. The student musicians describe their bonds with their instruments = a love story. The repair staff display their appreciation for the life renewal given the repaired instruments by the graduating performers.

The documentary climaxes with a complete orchestra of L.A.U.S.D. alumni graduates of yesterday and tomorrow playing an original symphony in celebration of The Last Repair Shop.
