"Yes sir," "Thank you ma'am," "Excuse me please..." phrases gone the way of the dodo in today's world. Respect and regard for authority? Honour, manners, etiquette? Vanished. Care, empathy...poof! These have all been piled on to the debris heap of yesterday.

Our system, once bonded by the proper manners and mutual respect for each other are threatened to complete eradication today. Manners, respect, mutual consideration of others...on the heap, rejected by more and more people today and a certain world leader leads this social disintegration.

Crime and violence are another story. Parking your car in your driveway is an invitation to the car thief, even in broad daylight. A minor rear end collision

could be the opening salvo to a carjacking. At gun point no less. The prevalence of violent crimes trickles down to even the most minor facets of our society. As many employees of call centres will attest, each working shift is a test of patience, durability and resilience.

Recently, I spent an hour trying to get a phone number for a Canadian government department. Hearing bot after bot, listening to endless robot messages, one scripted phrase really grabbed me: over and over, almost every one of the robot replies had this *cautionary note added to* it, "if aggressive, rude or harassing language is used, the call will be disconnected."

Wow, such a message added to every one of the calls I heard makes me think, many people must be responding in anger or aggressive language and so often that companies must include a warning in their automated phone calls. That's an indication of the troubled times in which we are living. Evidently, these kinds of offensive messages must be very common, so much so that companies have to add these warning messages to their call responses.

The anonymity of social media or the easy access to social media may be the cause of this growing disrespect and anger in our society. Perhaps it is reflection of the violence and aggression televised so often by our news broadasts. Perhaps it is the hatred and aggression so thematic to so many cinematic productions from Hollywood. What ever the cause, there is no denying our citizenry is too ready to jump in with guns blazing, anger flaming and aggression blasting away.

What happened to raising children to be respectful of authority, older people and others? Are parents becoming slipshod in teaching their children what we were taught? Are teachers slipping in what they teach our young people? It certainly looks like our society is on a slippery slope downward.

Bottom line...

Get back on top of your game if you influence younger people. Accept respect and proper behaviour in dealing with people, seniors and authority figures. Let's bring back the days of 'thank you,' 'yes sir,' 'no ma'am' and the like. However, people in positions of authority, influence and teaching may need reminding that they themselves need to act as people deserving of respect. They have to treat people respectfully and with reciprocal sensitivity and care. You shouldn't be giving people "the bird" just because they cut in front of you on the road, or in the line at the bank. Say something like "you're in a hurry, eh?" rather than calling them a name. Better yet, don't say anything at all or show any angry response.

We live in tough times. Let's return to the days when we treated others as we want to be treated, with respect, courtesy and care.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus may be the new COVID.

Hey people! Have you heard about **RSV**? Well, maybe you should know about it and how to keep it at bay this winter. There's no need to panic, but it's good to be in the know!

What's the deal with RSV?

RSV, or *Respiratory Syncytial Virus*, is a pesky virus that loves to make an appearance during Canadian winters. It's not just a kid thing—older folks and anyone with a wonky immune system need to watch out.

Who's at risk?

- The Young and the Young at Heart: babies and grandparents;
- **The Not-So-Fighting Fit**: If you have heart or lung issues, diabetes, or a weakened immune system, you are an easy prey for the RSV virus.

How to Spot It

RSV's a sneaky one – it can look like a cold, the flu, or even COVID. Here's what to watch for:

- Starts with a runny nose and maybe a low fever
- Might progress to wheezing and trouble breathing

I read a lot, nightly before 'lights out.' I have written this before, I prefer to read digitally, on my iPad rather than with a book.

The benefits of reading on a digital device, iPad

With an iPad, I can do things that enhance my actual reading. In a second window, I can confer with a map to find the location of what I am reading, even look at the street where the action takes place (if it is a non-fiction book). With Stuart Woods books, I can not only look at the restaurants he writes about, the menus in those restaurants but even photos of the meals. I can look up unfamiliar words, get definitions, find translations of foreign phrases. With a digital device, I have access to a whole world of information, wikipedia, library of congress, reference books and the wide world of web.

When I am done, get back to reading my book and I am in control. If I don't want to look it up, I can just continue reading without interruption.

Another convenience, though this can be done in a book by folding the page corner, I can mark where I left off.

Another...in digital reading, I can highlight words, lines, paragraphs and even write notes

about it. In a real book, I must write in it with pencil or, verboten, with a pen.

Finally, digital books can be borrowed from almost any library in North America. You just have to have a library card. I don't buy books as my book shelves already have too many books. So I borrow. I borrow from multiple libraries in Ontario and from one of the largest libraries in the USA, Broward library in Florida. They gave me an electronic library card and I can search for and borrow hundreds of of books. Convenient, practical, boundless, and free!

Easy Voice Recorder is a *free* app for your cellphone that will surprise you with its capability and features.

The app can record anything it hears, the spoken word, music, random sounds...if you can hear it, *Easy Voice Recorder* can record it and you can listen to it any time you wish and as often as you want.

Make notes as you listen

This app is ideal for individuals who are responsible for keeping text records of meetings. You can type up your text file, pause the recording as you need, type your notes and resume listening, all at the touch of your cell phone screen.

Transcription feature

Even more awesome is that the *Easy Voice Recorder* has a 'transcribe' feature which will type everything that was recorded into a text record. You simply click the '*Transcription*' icon and the app will produce a typed record of the recorded material in a few moments. Now you can paste the typed text into the processor you use and edit it as you wish.

That's all there is to it...simple, straightforward and easy to use. A voice recorder that converts the recorded words into a typed text record and as easy to use as any word processing program.


